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Zbigniew Karpiński is an Assistant Professor in the Institute of Philosophy and Sociology of the Polish Academy of Sciences (IFiS PAN). He also teaches introductory statistics and research methods in Collegium Civitas, a private school in Warsaw. He got his Ph.D in 2008 from the IFiS PAN for a dissertation on empirical tests of Blau's macrostructural theory. His scientific interests include: the study of cooperation and trust under diversity and inequality; popular perceptions of justice and reactions to injustice; formal theoretical models of homophily and intergroup ties; status processes and reproduction of inequality. His work is informed by the use of large-scale data (e.g., data from cross-national and longitudinal surveys) or experiments to test predictions derived from well-developed sociological theories. His papers were published in *Sociological Theory*, *International Journal of Sociology*, and *ASK Research and Methods*.
