IDENTIFICATION KEY OF O. jamaicensis, O. leucocephala and their hybrids

by **Carlos Urdiales & Pablo Pereira**, **1993**, 31 pp., 42 colour photos, available from SEO/BirdLife International.

SEO/BirdLife distribute this document to ornithological publications and libraries to spread the knowledge of serious risk for the conservation of the endangered White-headed Duck *Oxyura leucocephala*.

This species hybridize with an exotic and introduced species the Ruddy Duck *O. jamaicensis*, which was introduced into Great Britain in the 1950s, first because of accidental escapes and voluntary releases thereafter.

The Ruddy Duck is spreading over the Western Palearctic and the hybridisation, as have been already confirmed in Spain, is responsible for the serious treat for the conservation of the White-headed Duck as a genetic pure species.

The identification key gives the main features of the pure species *O. leucocephala* (dark and pale phases) and *O. jamaicensis* and all the different identified hybrid types between the two species captured up to date in Spain. Diagnostic field characteristics and a possible interpretation of their genealogy are also included.

[Klucz do oznaczania O. leucocephala, O. jamaicensis i ich hybryd]

W ostatnich latach liczebność sterniczki *O. leucocephala* gwałtownie spada. Jednym z czynników stanowiących dodatkowe zagrożenie dla tego gatunku jest jej łatwe krzyżowanie się z egzotycznym, sztucznie sprowadzonym w latach 50tych na Wyspy Brytyjskie, gatunkiem — sterniczką jamajską *O. jamaicensis*. Ostatnie doniesienia wskazują, że gatunek ten dotarł już do Ukrainy.

Omawiany klucz zawiera szczegółowe opisy wszystkich typów mieszańców schwytanych dotychczas w Hiszpanii, oraz porównuje je z wyglądem czystych gatunków *O. jamaicensis* i *O. leucocephala* (w odmianie jasnej i ciemnej).

INSTRUCTION TO AUTHORS

ACTA ORNITHOLOGICA accepts for publication papers that have not been published (or are not submitted for publication) elsewhere. The total volume of manuscript (including abstract, tables, illustrations, bibliography and summary) should not exceed 30 pages. However in justified cases exceptions of this rule are made. Manuscripts in English (preferably) or Polish should be supplied to the Editor in 2 complete copies. The editorial style of the manuscript should be modelled on a current issues of ACTA. Title of the paper should not be long or too general. The title (and section headings) should end without a full stop.

Abstract (up to 200 words) should not repeat the title. It should rather summarize main results of the paper, and methods applied, than list its contents. It should be complete in itself without reference to other parts of the paper. It should use scientific latin names of the species, if these were not mentioned in the title.

Up to 5 key words should be given beneath the abstract, and under them there should be the postal address and institutional affiliation (in English) of the author (authors).

Contents of the paper should be concise and it should omit all material not essential to an understanding of the main matter. The text should be formulated in short sentences. The results of the work, and the way in which they were obtained, should be presented in the past tense, and regular or permanent situations (such as geographical location) — in present tense. Scientific latin names of taxa in text, tables, and in bibliography — should be written in *italics*, but not in parenthesis. English names of species should begin with capital letters, and their latin names should also be given with the first usage in the text.

Dates should be written with the years given in full, with their components separated by spaces (not dots) — e.g. "1 V 1990", and periods of time — by hyphens ("3-5 X", "1990-1993").

Numerical values with abbreviated units and ranges of values — should be written without spaces ("3p/10ha", "pp.4-7").

Citations should be made with the author and year system — e.g. "reported by Taczanowski (1882)", "(Taczanowski 1882)", "(Cieślak & Dombrowski 1992)" — when two authors, "Dyrcz et al. 1984)" — when more than two authors. Multiple references should be given in alphabetic order of authors — e.g. "(Czarnecki 1954, 1979, Rydzewski 1935, 1979a, 1979b)". Personal communications, materials in preparation and other unpublished data should be cited in text only (not in References), with author's initials. Tables and figures must be referred to in the text by their arabic numbers — e.g. "Tab. 3, Fig. 3)".

Tables and figures should be understandable without reference to the text. They should be planned according to dimensions of the column or page (2 columns) in ACTA. The same data should not be presented in both tables and illustrations. Tables should use scientific latin names of species. Figures should use contrast and bold drawing and dimensions about twice the size proposed for printing. Letters and other details should be large enough for twofold reduction in printing.

Titles of journals should be abbreviated as in the World List of Scientific Periodicals. Titles of works published in languages other than English and German (e.g. Russian, French, Polish), if they have English summary, should be given only in English, and in square brackets — []. References written in non-latin script (e.g. Cyrillic) should be transcribed according to international rules (ISO). The author is responsible for the accuracy of references cited.

Summary in English language papers is translated (by the Editor) into Polish. Its volume should not exceed 1/5 of the main text of the paper. It should refer to tables, figures and (if necessary) to the References.

After acceptance of the paper, its final version should be submitted on computer floppy disc together with a complete printed copy. Preferred text editors: WinWord, WordPerfect 5.1. The computer written manuscript should follow editorial recommendations above, as well as possible additional instruction from the Editor. Words should not be split by hyphens (even if the editor does it automatically). No underlines or highlighting print (with exception of particular cases concerning data in tables) should be used. The quality of illustrations should enable them to be reproduced directly by scanning (and for the reduction in size - see above). The author's disc will be returned with the proof.

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Reprints — 25 free copies will be provided to the main author of the paper. More copies may be ordered at current prices when proof is returned.

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
